Request a Disability Accommodation for Your Home

What Is a Reasonable Accommodation?

A reasonable accommodation is a change to rules, policies, or practices that allows individuals with disabilities and their family members equal access to housing.



Example Accommodations:

- Allow an assistance animal in a no-pet building.
- Install grab bars in the bathroom.
- Provide accessible parking or entrances.

When individuals with disabilities request reasonable accommodations in housing, they exercise their rights under the Fair Housing Act. Unfortunately, these requests can be met with harassment, intimidation, or retaliation from landlords, property managers, or even neighbors.

Harassment can take many forms, including repeated denials of reasonable requests, verbal abuse, threats of eviction, or a hostile living environment. Such actions are not only unjust but also illegal. If you or someone you know is facing harassment after requesting an accommodation, please contact the Connecticut Fair Housing Center.

Fair housing laws exist to ensure that everyone has equal access to safe and inclusive housing—free from discrimination and harassment.



The Fair Housing Act makes it unlawful to discriminate in housing based on disability, among other protections.
